Programming on Adolescents Issues in Telangana A Workshop with District Level Stakeholders Dates: 5th & 6th October 2023

Organized by: Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Hyderabad, and UNICEF, Hyderabad in collaboration with Departments of WCD,Rural Development / SERP, MEPMA, NYKS and NSS **Venue:** TSIRD, Rajendranagar, Hyderabad

Background

The issues of child marriage and prevalence of anemia have their interdependence on women's literacy levels, educational status, access to information, economic status, decision making power, gender-based dynamics, nutrition related practices and influence of social norms. The below data from NFHS-5 indicates the general status of women and its direct or indirect correlation with child marriage and anemia related statistics.

Status of Women & Adolescents: Female literacy (15-49 years) in Telangana as per NFHS-5 is 78.6% for urban and 56.6% for rural women. Currently married women who usually participate in their household decisions was 88.9% in urban areas and 86.2% in rural areas which perhaps indicates the positive impact of agency of women through SHG movement in the state. 28.2% women in urban areas and 55.5% in rural areas reported that they worked in the last 12 months and were paid in cash. Women having a mobile phone that they themselves use was 75.2% for urban and 50.6% for rural women. 43.9% of urban women and 15.8% of rural women reported to have ever used internet. Ever-married women in the age group of 18-49 years who have ever experienced spousal violence stands at 27.3% for urban and 42.3% for rural women. Men of age 15 years and above who consume alcohol was reported to be 33.9% for urban areas and 49.0% for rural.

About one fifth or 20% of the population in Telangana is in the age group of 11 to 19 years. This group requires a special focus in the areas of education, protection — early marriage, violence & abuse, health — sexual & reproductive health in particular, nutrition, WASH - particularly menstrual hygiene, skilling & employability, mental & emotional health, gender-based discrimination etc.

Child Marriage: The overall percentage of child marriage in Telangana as per NFHS-5 is 23.5% which is directly linked to discontinuation of secondary / higher education. In urban areas, 16.7% women were married before 18 years of age whereas in rural areas, it was 27.4%. For boys, marriage before 21 years stood at 9.1% in urban areas and 21.1% in rural areas. As per DISE 2021 data, 12.9% of girls and 14.5% of boys in Telangana drop out of secondary school. NFHS-5 also reveals that the dropout from school is more in the age group of 14 to 17 years and in certain districts of Telangana 30-40% girls are being pulled into early marriage, which is higher than the state average. Early marriage puts the girls at the risk of teenage pregnancies, marital violence, health issues, anemia, maternal morbidity & mortality, mental health challenges etc and leaves them with low self-esteem and in economically deprived condition.

Anemia: NFHS-5 for Telangana reported high prevalence of anemia among adolescent girls (15 – 19 years) with 63.6% in urban areas and 65.2% in rural. 64.7% children of under 5 years age in urban areas and 72.8% in rural areas were found to be anemic. Total children aged 6-23 months receiving an adequate diet was only 8.4% in urban and 9.7% in rural areas. Prevalence of anemia among pregnant women (15-49 years) was at 50.4% in urban areas and 54.4% in rural areas. IFA consumption by pregnant women for 100 days was 63.2% among urban women and 54.6% for rural. 180 days of IFA consumption among pregnant women was significantly lower at 37.0% for urban and 32.7% for rural areas.

The agency of parents and young people/youth can play a critical role in influencing the social norms and behaviours that are drivers of child marriage and anemia. In this context, UNICEF and TISS partnered to engage with Self-Help Groups (SHGs) under the Society for Elimination of Rural Poverty (SERP) and the Mission for Elimination of Poverty in Municipal Areas (MEPMA) as well as youth groups of NYKS and NSS programmes.

- 2. Understand the desired change (for ending child marriage and preventing anemia) at different levels adolescents, parents, community

- 4. Learn about the campaign package and other tools for ending child marriage and anemia preventing and their use
- 5. Agree on an action plan for ending child marriage and preventing anemia through the agency of adolescents / young people and their parents
